

On Friday the 30th of November, some of our students had the opportunity to be on SBS Radio Italian. Natalie Hermiz (year 9), Isabella and Julia Chaperon (year 10), students of the immersion program, showcased their Italian language to introduce themselves and spoke about the advantages of the Immersion Program of Gladstone Park SC. According to them, studying History, Geography and Mathematics in Italian for three years has provided them with a wide vocabulary and a solid knowledge of the language that they are eager to use once they will travel to Italy.



Meanwhile, students of the year 9 SEAL class, Andre Alberto, Nicole De Silva and Tijana Jovic memorised a poem in Italian for the Dante

Alighieri Poetry Competition that unfortunately this year did not take place because of the prolonged lockdown. It was a special occurrence, though, as this year the Italian communities around the world celebrated the 700th anniversary of the Italian poet's death. Therefore, Ms Curini organised these students' participation in the SBS transmission where they did not only present themselves in Italian but demonstrated they impressive dedication to work and ability to deal with challenges.

Not having had the chance to recite it in front of a jury, Andre Alberto recited for SBS Radio, with no cue cards or prompts, the poem he chose from the list prescribed by Dante Melbourne: an excerpt from Dante Alighier's *Divina Commedia, Canto 1, Paradiso.* Not an easy task, as it took four weeks for him to learn it by heart. Andre also researched about the meaning of the poem and demonstrated the power of our brain to retain information. In a society completely

run by computers like the one foreseen by Isaac Asimov, we like to believe that memory is still very important and that training it will help us to have a better, healthier and longer life.
